The most important event during the year came when we all gathered in the hall to sing Christmas Carob.

After fourth grade we jumped high enough to enter Min Jensen's fifth grade room, on second floor. We lost Mayis Wangler and Warner Quirk but gained LaDon Hoefling and Sharon Roberts on the way up. At first we got rather tised after climbing the those long flights of stairs. We always looked forward to the day when the teacher's boy friend came to visit school. Each of us had our turn at teasing poor teacher about him.
