


On each page lives a story, And between each line is a smile or tear. It contains the failures we've endured, And successes we've worked for.














































A year of experience gained exists on these pages. This book brings a year of our lives to a close. And gives way to the unexplored path ahead of us. It is our impression of 1981.





All of these people give their best and are greeted often with little or no recognition, so we would like to take this opportunity to say "Thouks"?












The most common extracurricular activity takes place in the bund and music rooms. A majority of the students in the high school are involved in




